**Grevy's Zebra Where:** Wild Africa,

We welcomed our second endangered Grevy's Zebra foal, Tari on 28 December. Together with his half-sister, Izara, the pair contributes to the sustainable population of this species in human care.



## Malayan Box Turtle Where: RepTopia,

We saw the addition of three endangered Malayan Box Turtles who currently share the tank with the Yellow-spotted River Turtle. These turtles sport a dark olive head with three yellow stripes along each side, so keep a look out!



### Sakishima Grass Lizard

Where: RepTopia BOH, Singapore Zoo

Sakishima Grass Lizards are held by few zoological institutions in the world and reproduce slowly as females generally lay clutches of only one to two eggs. Visitors can spot two of these endangered lizard



Golden Mantellas

Where: RepTopia BOH, Singapore Zoo

These bright yellow amphibians are endemic to central-eastern Madagascar and feed on a variety of insects. We have had great success in breeding this species, with close to 70 hatched in the last year.

Night Safari also welcomed our latest Southern Three-banded Armadillo pup last year. Mom and baby are currently enjoying bonding in an off-exhibit area and here, you can seem both enjoying a satisfying meal of vegetables and mealworms!



### **Sunda Slow Loris**

Where: Night Safari

Christmas Day was extra special at Night Safari with the birth of a Sunda Slow Loris. Native to Southeast Asia, these endearing primates have been threatened with extinction due to the growing demand in the illegal pet trade and supposed healing properties in traditional medicine.



### Blue-eyed Cockatoo

Where: Jurong Bird Park

A trio of Blue-eyed Cockatoo chicks were hatched at Jurong Bird Park in 2021. These beauties are vulnerable due to habitat loss and poaching for the illegal wildlife trade. They join the largest population of this species in a zoological institution in the world!



#### Straw-headed Bulbul

Where: Jurong Bird Park

The team at Jurong Bird Park successfully hatched three critically endangered Straw-headed Bulbuls. These gregarious birds have fallen victim to the caged-bird trade due to their melodic voices. These are also the largest species of Bulbuls and are native to Singapore.
